

PREFACE

This publication summarizes the fiscal year (FY) 2025 Budget for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Throughout this publication any reference to the "Budget" is in regard to the 2025 Budget, unless otherwise noted. All references to years refer to fiscal year, except where specifically noted. The budgetary tables throughout this document show actual amounts for 2022 and 2023, annualized Continuing Resolution levels for 2024, and the President's Budget request for 2025. Amounts for 2024 estimated levels include: non-enacted amounts such as Full-Time Equivalent levels, fleet levels, information technology investment levels, recovery levels, transfers in and out, balances available end of year, and obligation levels.

Throughout this publication, the "2018 Farm Bill" is used to refer to the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018. Most programs funded by the 2018 Farm Bill are funded through 2023. Amounts shown in 2024 and 2025 for most Farm Bill programs reflect those confirmed in the baseline.

Pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, sequestration is included in the numbers for mandatory programs in 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025.

In tables throughout this document, amounts equal to zero (0) are displayed as dashes (-). Amounts less than 0.5 and greater than zero are rounded and shown as a zero (0). This display treatment is used to prevent the masking of non-zero amounts that do not round up to one (1).

AGENCY-WIDE

PURPOSE STATEMENT

The Office of Hearings and Appeals (OHA) consolidated the three previously separate entities of the National Appeals Division (NAD), the Office of the Administrative Law Judges (OALJ), and the Office of the Judicial Officer (OJO). Previously, OALJ and OJO were offices under Departmental Administration, and NAD was an independent agency that reports to the USDA Secretary.

The mission of OHA is to plan, coordinate, and provide administrative support for NAD, OALJ, and OJO. OHA promotes fairness, transparency, and consistency in NAD, OALJ, and OJO proceedings through the planning, coordination, and administration of office-wide activities and initiatives. OHA adjudicates first-and second-level hearings and appeals at USDA.

OHA Headquarters is located in Alexandria, Virginia. NAD, a division within OHA administers its appeals system through three regional offices located in Memphis, Tennessee; Indianapolis, Indiana; and Lakewood, Colorado. The NAD Administrative Judges are located in field locations throughout the United States and operate out of leased office space or home offices. OALJ and OJO are located in USDA's South Building in Washington, DC.

As of September 30, 2023, there were 74 permanent full-time employees, comprising of 19 in Virginia and 55 in the field.

OHA did not have any Office of Inspector General or Government Accountability Office evaluation reports during the past year.



JUSTIFICATION OF CHANGES

Office of Hearings and Appeals

The base funds will continue to support the mission of OHA to promote fairness, transparency, and consistency in NAD, OALJ, and OJO proceedings through the planning, coordination, and administration of office-wide activities and initiatives.

1. An increase of \$424,000 (\$16,703,000 and 75 FTEs available in 2024).

The funding change is requested for the following items:


An increase of \$424,000 for pay costs. This increase will support an annualization of the 2024 5.2 percent Cost of Living pay increase and the 2025 2.0 percent Cost of Living pay increase. Without this funding the Office of Hearing and Appeals would have limited ability to meet the strict statutory deadlines for the National Appeals Division to hold hearings and issue appeal and review determinations. These mission area activities are performed by Administrative Judges and Appeals Officers, who are geographically dispersed throughout the United States and supported by three regional offices and a headquarters office. Similarly, Office of Administrative Law Judges conducts rulemaking and adjudicatory hearings throughout the country in proceedings that are subject to the Administrative Procedure Act, 5 U.S.C. § 551 et seq., under approximately 50 statutes administered by USDA agencies. The Office of Judicial Officer is delegated authority to act as the final deciding officer for the United States Department of Agriculture in adjudicatory proceedings listed in 7 C.F.R. § 2.35. Failure to receive this increase would prevent OHA from fully performing its mission, which is necessary to ensure continued support for the Department as well as meeting the needs of the Executive Office of the President and members of Congress. Over eighty percent of OHA's appropriation comprises of salaries and benefits and although OHA will streamline and economize all activity areas, by statute OHA may not receive personnel, informational technology, and other support services except on a reimbursable basis.

STATUS OF PROGRAMS

Current Activities

NAD conducts fair and impartial administrative appeal hearings and reviews of adverse decisions by certain agencies within USDA, and issues determinations in an expeditious manner that reflect a thorough consideration of factual information that reach a proper conclusion. Adjudicative activities include:

- Appealability Determinations: The Director reviews hundreds of agency decisions when an agency notifies a participant that it does not believe an administrative decision is appealable.
- Pre-Hearing Conferences: NAD conducts pre-hearing conferences to identify and/or narrow the issues in the appeal and help parties understand the evidence they need to present at the hearing.
- Hearings: In the first-level appeals process, NAD Administrative Judges conduct impartial administrative hearings and issue determinations, which include decisions about attorney fees under the Equal Access to Justice Act that reflect a thorough consideration of factual and legal information.
- Reviews: On petition, in a second-level appeal, the NAD Director reviews Administrative Judge Appeal Determinations, renders second –level decisions about attorney fees under the Equal Access to Justice Act, and may grant equitable relief to the same extent, as such authority is provided to the Secretary.

OALJ conducts rulemaking and adjudicatory hearings nationwide under approximately 50 statutes that are subject to the Administrative Procedure Act (5 U.S.C. §§ 551 *et seq.*). Adjudicative activities include:

- *Initial Decisions*: Judges issue initial decisions and orders in disciplinary and enforcement proceedings, which become final decisions of the Secretary unless appealed to the Judicial Officer.
- Consent Decisions: Judges approve consent decisions entered by the parties, which resolve disputes by settlement.
- Publication of Agricultural Decisions: OALJ publishes Agriculture Decisions, the official compilation of
 decisions and orders issued in adjudicatory proceedings conducted for the Department.

OJO is delegated authority to act as the final deciding officer for the United States Department of Agriculture in adjudicatory proceedings listed in 7 C.F.R. § 2.35. Adjudicatory activities include:

- Review of ALJ Decisions: On petition for review, the Judicial Officer reviews initial adjudicatory
 decisions issued by USDA's Administrative Law Judges. This second-level review may include
 Administrative Law Judge decisions about attorney fees under the Equal Access to Justice Act.
- Reparation Decisions: The Judicial Officer issues reparation decisions under the Packers and Stockyards Act (P&S Act) and the Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act (PACA). Review of Decisions Subject to the APA: The Judicial Officer reviews decisions in adjudicatory proceedings that are subject to the Administrative Procedure Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 556, 557.

Selected Examples of Recent Progress

In 2023, NAD:

- Processed 678 cases filed with NAD.
- Issued 55 appealability determinations when appellants challenged the agency's view that a decision was not appealable. Outcome was favorable to appellants in 98 percent of the cases.
- Conducted 356 in-person or telephonic hearings, videoconferences, and reviews of the record.
- Issued 724 determinations, of which 585 were issued by Administrative Judges and 139 were issued by the NAD Director. Outcome was favorable to appellants in 33 percent of the cases. In 48 Review Determinations, appellants were granted equitable relief.
- Increased transparency of the USDA appeals process by publishing more than 5700 determinations on the NAD website in 2023; over 25,300 have been published on the <u>USDA National Appeals Division website</u> since the program began.
- Accepted over 1,800 eFile requests, which have been processed since NAD introduced the option to electronically file requests in February 2013.

In 2023, OALJ:

- Opened 99 new cases.
- Closed 69 cases related to USDA programs involving the Agricultural Marketing Service (Federal Grain Inspection Service, Packers and Stockyards Division, and PACA Division); Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service; Farm Production and Conservation Business Center; Food Safety and Inspection Service; and Forest Service.
- Conducted formal adjudicative proceedings:
 - Conducted multiple pre-hearing and orientation conferences to prepare parties and participants for virtual hearings, which assisted the parties in settling cases.
 - o Conducted 4 remote hearings via telephone conference and online platform.
 - Issued decisions in 6 cases without formal hearings, based on the written record only, via summary judgment.
- Conducted formal rulemaking proceeding hearings:
 - Conducted week-long public hearing in Tennessee regarding proposals to amend Appalachian, Southeast, and Florida Federal milk marketing orders (Docket No. 23-J-0019), initiated by the Agricultural Marketing Service.
 - Conducted 5 weeks of national public hearings in Indiana regarding proposals to amend pricing formulas in 11 Federal milk marketing orders (Docket No. 23-J-0067), initiated by the Agricultural Marketing Service.

In 2023 OJO:

- Issued 199 decisions that arose from administrative appeals of initial decisions of administrative law judges, questions of law certified to the Judicial Officer, and reparation complaints involving commercial transactions brought by private parties using USDA's dispute resolution mechanism.
- Matters decided involved a range of important agricultural requirements including measures to detect and prevent the spread of animal disease, determination of unfair and deceptive practices in agricultural commerce, sourcing of federal timber, and compliance with animal welfare and transportation requirements. Matters before OJO arose under numerous statutes including the Packers and Stockyards Act, Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act, Animal Welfare Act, Horse Protection Act, Commercial Transportation of Equines for Slaughter Act, Animal Health Protection Act, and Forest Resources Conservation and Shortage Relief Act. Decisions also addressed procedural requirements under the Rules of Practice and constitutional challenges.
- Resolved numerous reparation claims by private parties and ordered damages where appropriate for violations of statutory requirements under the Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act and Packers and Stockyards Act.
- Launched OJO's redesigned public facing website in collaboration with OHA to achieve 508 compliance and to improve accessibility to issued decisions and understanding of adjudicatory practices and procedures.
